

When Dean Gary Chiodo asked me to take over as interim department chair, it was the last thing on my mind. In the Summer of 2018 the UW School of Dentistry was in the midst of a financial crisis. The Provost had cancelled residency

interviews on short notice and was even talking about closing The Center for Pediatric Dentistry. The future did not look bright. However, Dr. Chiodo promised me that if I accepted the position he would make sure that we had everything we needed to be successful. I came back to him a week later with a list.

Almost five years later so much has changed. Shortly after our conversation, Dean Chiodo publicly announced that we would be staying at our Magnuson Park location. In fact, the School has invested significantly in that clinical site and we now share the building with UW Oral Surgery. This partnership makes our clinic the busiest and most productive in the entire School. Now the financial health of the department is much improved too. Today, not only are we a safety net clinic to our region's most deserving patients and the primary clinical site for students learning pediatric dentistry, we're also revenue positive.

If you were to walk into the Department these days you'd recognize many people that you knew from years past, but there are a lot of new faces too. From our clinical management team to our administrative core, we've been fortunate to recruit some incredible new team members (page 4). I'm also proud to say that over 12 years since opening, the clinical facility is still impressive. We've kept things looking fresh by repainting the lobby in UW colors, updating the toys and TVs in the waiting area, and hanging new artwork that showcases scenes from the Pacific Northwest. This was all

made possible through the Floyd and Delores Jones Pediatric Dental Endowed Support fund (page 11).

The Department has also been very fortunate to receive several large federal grants in the past few years: I-SPAN (focused on interdisciplinary dentistry and care of children with special needs page 3); EChOTrain (developing relationships between pediatric dentistry and dental hygiene); and now, we are working with the Regional Affairs Office on PATH (a dental workforce pipeline project that aims to increase career opportunities for students in the dental professions). These programs have made a huge difference in the education and clinical care that we are able to provide, and they have assisted us in recruiting and retaining top quality staff, students, residents, and faculty.

Finally, I'd like to offer a remembrance of, Dr. Bertha Barriga, one of my favorite instructors from the time I was in residency at the UW. I loved her ability to firmly but kindly relay feedback and how knowledgeable Dr. Barriga was about patient care. I still recall being confused when she told me she was permanently retiring. How? Why? She was one of our best instructors! "Sometimes you just know that it is the right time," she told me. In late 2021 it saddened me to hear that Dr. Barriga passed away. Many months later I was surprised and humbled to hear that she bequeathed her estate to the UW. We are incredibly grateful for her generosity, and I can confidently say that the values that she so strongly believed in will live on through this legacy. I would like to recognize the incredible generosity of Dr. Barriga and all of our stakeholders. Thank you so much. Your gifts of time, talents, and money truly do fund the excellence that we strive for at UW Pediatric Dentistry.

Interdisciplinary Special Needs Dental Access Network (I-SPAN)





In May of 2020 the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) awarded Title VII grants for postdoctoral training in pediatric, general, and public health dentistry. The University of Washington was incredibly fortunate to receive one of these 5-year \$2.25 million grants. This generous funding supports DENTAL ACCESS NETWORK development of:

- Enhanced didactic training in the Care of Children with Special Healthcare Needs
 - We developed the capacity to produce high-quality audio/ video recordings by purchasing computer, camera, and lighting equipment.
 - We have recorded lectures by our own faculty and visiting experts on a wide variety of topics, including behavior guidance, childhood obesity, obstructive sleep apnea, bleeding disorders, safety, child growth and development, TMJ care, disability, ethics, medical management of caries, communication, and many others. These resources are used regularly in our student and resident courses.
 - Our residents are completing educational rotations to the Seattle Children's Hospital Autism Center and the UW Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND) program.
 - We purchased a high-fidelity simulation manneguin for emergency training. Pediatric HAL blinks its eyes, talks, and can even have a seizure!
- Development of an Interdisciplinary Dentistry (ID) Center at the
 - We have partnered with colleagues from UW Orthodontics, Periodontics, Prosthodontics, and Endodontics to create an interdisciplinary course. Drs. Cook, Mikkelson, and Nelson are leads from our department. In the course, experts give lectures on ID topics such as orthodontic finishing, management of missing premolars, canine substitution,

- autotransplantation, alveolar ridge management, molar substitution, and many others.
- Patients with conditions such as oligodontia, dentinogenesis imperfecta, amelogenesis imperfecta, and dental trauma are assigned to resident teams. The teams develop treatment plans that are based upon input from all specialties and present their findings to the ID group.
- This program has powerfully enhanced our resident education, and it allows us to provide care that patients with some of the most challenging dental conditions need.
- We are working with UW School of Dentistry Advancement to develop a fund to help support care of patients in the ID program.
- Expanded Access to Baby and Child Dentistry (ABCD) curriculum (ABCD Enhanced) and enhancements to the state care network of providers who will care for children with medical and dental complexity.
 - In 2022 WA State Health Care Authority began providing enhanced reimbursement for providers who had received specific training in the care of children with special needs.
 - Our team created the ABCD Enhanced curriculum, and we administer the asynchronous online delivery and training documentation. Hundreds of providers have now been trained.
 - One of the goals of the grant is to have more children with special needs access dental care near their homes, which is more likely with increased ABCD Enhanced training statewide.
 - We have also developed a network of Champions throughout the State who collaborate with us to provide care for children with complex needs in their regions.

2023 Graduates

Her thesis research will be beneficial to the residency program and is entitled, "Continuous Quality Improvement in a Pediatric Dental Residency Using Design Thinking." She plans to practice in Western Washington near her family.

In the past two years we have welcomed two key members of our administrative team:



Social Work at UW Pediatric Dentistry

Due to generous support from the *Floyd & Delores Jones Pediatric Dentistry Endowed Support Fund* (established in 2017), once again we have a social work program at the CPD. For the past year we were very fortunate to have Ms Klarissa Fellows (MSW) as our staff social worker. Klarissa recently moved on to another position in the area, but we thank her for all the work she put into developing the program.

Social work services continue to play a crucial role in ensuring that patients receive consistent dental care. Families that access care at Center for Pediatric Dentistry (CPD) often face difficulties around transportation, health insurance, financial barriers, dental anxieties, and caregiver navigation. The CPD social work program has helped numerous families connect to resources to support them in overcoming barriers that make it difficult to attend and maintain dental visits.

New Odessa Brown Children's Clinic



Seattle Children's Hospital recently announced the opening of the new Odessa Brown Children's Clinic (OBCC) Othello Clinic. This location has expanded capacity to care for children in South Seattle and South King County with an additional 11 beautiful new operatories; 7 of which are prevention bays with xray access at the chairside; and 4 are negative pressure Quiet Rooms. The ceilings and walls throughout the clinic and waiting room have whimsical and calming child centric art created by local artists.

OBCC has maintained its historic model of care with a unique space called the Family Consult/Infant and Toddler Room. This room was designed to model medical exam rooms on Level 2 of the new building, allowing more integrated care across the two departments. It also serves as a way to engage and



empower families; showing them that it's possible to care for their children's teeth at home without any specialized dental equipment. The OBCC team frequently coordinates care with Nutritionists, WIC, Medical providers, Behavior Health providers, Social Work and Care Coordination/Social Determinants of Health Resources. OBCC continues to maintain a small and mighty orthodontic program for state insured patients that have medically necessary orthodontic needs.

The UW Pediatric Dental residents regularly work alongside Seattle Children's faculty and other learners from the Swedish/Seattle Special Care General Practice Program and Dental Hygiene students from Lake Washington Technical Institute and Seattle Central College. Dr. Bertha Barriga



Dr. Bertha Barriga, one of the early women graduates at the University of Washington School of Dentistry, passed away in August 2021. She had a 42-year dental career in Seattle and served as a part-time associate professor in the Department of Pediatric Dentistry. She

was also instrumental in establishing the Law-Lewis Endowed Lectureship, which has developed into a widely respected and well-attended annual event. This fund was later amended to an Endowed Professorship, with the purpose of enhancing the University's ability to recruit and retain distinguished faculty in the field of pediatric dentistry. Dr. Barriga included the Department in her estate by facilitating a generous legacy gift of over \$2.7 million, resulting in elevation of the fund to an Endowed Chair in 2023. As such, the impact of this fund has been greatly enhanced and will provide additional support for the departmental activities that Dr. Barriga felt were most important.
